Topic: Solar and Energy Storage Project

Summary

The District is in the process of building a solar and energy storage project to provide redundant power during disasters.

Discussion

The solar and energy storage project has progressed to final planning stages in advance of submission for a building permit. Part of this process was erection of story poles to demonstrate the scope of the project to neighbors and interested parties. Story poles provide a visual representation of the project elevation. The story poles on the North side of the proposed car port/solar panel mount rise fifteen (15) feet above grade. Grade in this area is seven (7) feet higher than the parking lot making the total height of the rear portion of the project twenty-two (22) feet above parking lot grade.

The District was alerted by the representative of an adjoining property owner that the height of the project would likely represent a visual nuisance to the property owner. District staff agrees that the height of the rear portion creates a visual nuisance and suggests that the Board consider other alternative methods of achieving energy resilience.

Conclusion

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors direct the Facilities Ad Hoc Committee and staff to consider alternative designs for the solar and energy storage project at Fire Station 91.

Topic: **Consideration of Resolution 2022-08 Accepting State Mandated Annual Fire Inspections Report in Compliance with SB 1205**

Summary

On September 27, 2018, the Governor of the State of California signed Senate Bill No. 1205. The bill mandates that every city or county fire department, or fire district shall report annually to its administering authority on its compliance with the Health and Safety Code, Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3. The Bill states that the report shall occur when the administering authority discusses its annual budget, or at another time determined by the administering authority.

This item is before the Board of Directors to request approval of Resolution 2022-08 (Attachment 1) accepting the state mandated annual fire inspection report, in compliance with SB 1205.

Discussion

The California State Fire Marshal, through the California Health and Safety Code, mandates that certain occupancy types shall be inspected annually. These mandated occupancy types include private and public schools, hotels, motels, lodging houses and apartment/condominium buildings in accordance with California Health and Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3. The purpose of annual fire inspections is to mitigate known hazards, reduce risk to the community and ensure reasonable compliance with the California Fire Code. The Montecito Fire Protection District performs the mandated inspections, as well as inspections of local businesses as part of the District's annual fire inspection program completed by engine companies and Fire Prevention Bureau personnel.

California Health and Safety Code Section 13146.3 mandates that the local fire department or district inspect all public and private schools once annually. The Montecito Fire Protection District inspected 10 of 10 school facilities during the 2021 calendar year.

California Health and Safety Code Section 13146.2 mandates that the local fire department or district inspect all hotels, motels, lodging houses, residential care facilities, and apartments annually. The California Building Code specifies that condominiums should be considered apartments for building code application. An apartment shall consist of three or more attached units and excludes all duplex and townhome buildings as defined by code. Residential care facilities may contain residents or clients that have a range of needs, including those related to custodial care, mobility impairments, cognitive disabilities, and similar.

The Montecito Fire Protection District inspected 11 of 11 hotels, motels, lodging houses, apartments, and residential care facilities operating in the District during the 2021 calendar year.

In total, the Montecito Fire Protection District conducted 21 of the 21 state mandated inspections during the 2021 calendar year, per the California Health and Safety Code.

The acceptance of this compliance report and the recommended Resolution fulfill the statutory requirements contained in California Health and Safety Code Sections 13146.2, 13146.3, and 13146.4, as amended by SB 1205.

Conclusion

Staff recommends that the Board approve Resolution 2022-08, accepting a report on the status of all state mandated annual fire inspections in the Montecito Fire Protection District in conjunction with SB 1205 and California Health and Safety Code Section 13146.4 requirements.

RESOLUTION 2022-08

**A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF THE MONTECITO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT,
ACKNOWLEDGING RECEIPT OF A REPORT MADE BY THE FIRE CHIEF OF THE
MONTECITO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT REGARDING THE INSPECTION OF CERTAIN
OCCUPANCIES REQUIRED TO RECEIVE ANNUAL INSPECTIONS PURSUANT TO SECTIONS
13146.2 AND 13146.3 OF THE CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE.**

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Section 13146.4 was added in 2018, and became effective on September 27, 2018; and,

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 requires all fire departments, including the Montecito Fire Protection District, that provide fire protection services to perform annual inspections in every building used as a public or private school, hotel, motel, lodging house, apartment house, and certain residential care facilities for compliance with building standards, as provided and,

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Section 13146.2 requires all fire departments, including the Montecito Fire Protection District, that provide fire protection services to report annually to its administering authority on its compliance with Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 and,

WHEREAS, the Board of the Montecito Fire Protection District intends this Resolution to fulfill the requirements of the California Health & Safety Code regarding acknowledgment of the Montecito Fire Protection District's compliance with California Health and Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of the Montecito Fire Protection District that said Board expressly acknowledges the measure of compliance of the Montecito Fire Protection District with California Health and Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 in the area encompassed by the Montecito Fire Protection District, as follows:

A. EDUCATIONAL GROUP E OCCUPANCIES:

Educational Group E occupancies are generally those public and private schools, used by more than six persons at any one time for educational purposes through the 12th grade. Within the Montecito Fire Protection District, there lie **10** Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities.

During the calendar year ending 12/31/21, the Montecito Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of **10** Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of **100 %** for this reporting period.

Additional items of note regarding this compliance rate can be found in the accompanying staff report for this resolution.

B. RESIDENTIAL GROUP R OCCUPANCIES:

Residential Group R occupancies, for the purposes of this resolution, are generally those occupancies containing sleeping units, and include hotels, motels, apartments (three units or more), etc., as well as other residential occupancies (including a number of residential care facilities). These residential care facilities have a number of different sub-classifications, and they may contain residents or clients that have a range of needs, including those related to custodial care, mobility impairments, cognitive disabilities, etc. The residents may also be non-ambulatory or bedridden. Within the Montecito Fire Protection District, there lie **11** Group R (and their associated sub-categories) occupancies of this nature.

During the calendar year ending 12/31/21, the Montecito Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of **11** Group R occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of **100%** for this reporting period.

Additional items of note regarding this compliance rate can be found in the accompanying staff report for this resolution.

Topic: Remote Teleconference Meetings

Summary

The Board of Directors has meet in-person and via teleconference meetings as allowed by Governor's Executive Order N-29-20 since April 2020. This executive order expired September 30, 2021. To continue Remote Teleconference Meetings, the Board must reaffirm this Resolution every thirty (30) days.

Discussion

The Board of Directors has meet in-person and via teleconference meetings as allowed by Governor's Executive Order N-29-20 since April 2020. This executive order expired on September 30, 2021. The Board passed Resolution 2022-06 on March 28, 2022 which allows the District to continue Remote Teleconference Meetings.

To continue Remote Teleconference Meetings, AB 361 requires that this Resolution be reaffirmed by the Board every thirty (30) days.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-07

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MONTECITO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY PERSISTS, RE-RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY GOVERNOR GAVIN NEWSOM DATED MARCH 4, 2020, AND RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MONTECITO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT FOR THE PERIOD OF 30 DAYS PURSUANT TO THE BROWN ACT PROVISIONS.

WHEREAS, the Montecito Fire Protection District ("Fire District") is a fire protection district duly organized and existing pursuant to the Fire Protection District Law of 1987 codified in Health & Safety Code section 13800 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the Fire District is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the Fire District's Board of Directors are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act, codified in California Government Code section 54950 et seq. ("Brown Act"), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the Fire District's Board of Directors conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provision for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the Fire District's boundaries, caused by natural, technological or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors previously adopted Resolution No. 2022-06, on March 28, 2022, finding that the requisite conditions exist for the Board of Directors of the Fire District to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in section 54953(e), the Board of Directors must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the Fire District's jurisdiction, and the Board of Directors has done so; and

WHEREAS, emergency conditions persist in the jurisdiction of the Fire District, specifically, a State of Emergency remains active as proclaimed by Governor Gavin Newsom's Proclamation of a State of Emergency dated March 4, 2020; and

WHEREAS, State and Local Officials have imposed and recommended social distancing measures and allowing legislative bodies to meet via teleconferencing to avoid risks to the health and safety of members of the public who would like to participate in meetings of the legislative bodies; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors does hereby find that Governor Gavin Newsom's Proclamation of State of Emergency and Social Distancing Orders and other conditions causing imminent risk to attendees has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the jurisdiction of the Fire District that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the Fire District, and desires to affirm a local emergency exists and re-ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California and re-ratify State and Local orders for social distancing; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency persisting, the Board of Directors does hereby find that the Fire District's Board of Directors shall continue to conduct their meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that such legislative bodies shall continue to comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, the Fire District shall continue to provide notice as otherwise required by the Brown Act of all public meetings.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MONTECITO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. Affirmation that Local Emergency Persists. The Board of Directors hereby considers the conditions of the state of emergency in the jurisdiction of the Fire District and proclaims that a local emergency persists throughout the jurisdiction of the Fire District and allowing remote access and participation in the Fire District's board meetings will reduce health and safety risks to attendees.

Section 3. Re-ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency. The Board hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.

Section 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Fire Chief or designee and the Board of Directors of the Fire District are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, continuing to conduct open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. Effective Date of Resolution. This Resolution shall take effect immediately

upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) May 25, 2022, or (ii) such time the Board of Directors adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the Board of Directors of the Montecito Fire Protection District may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

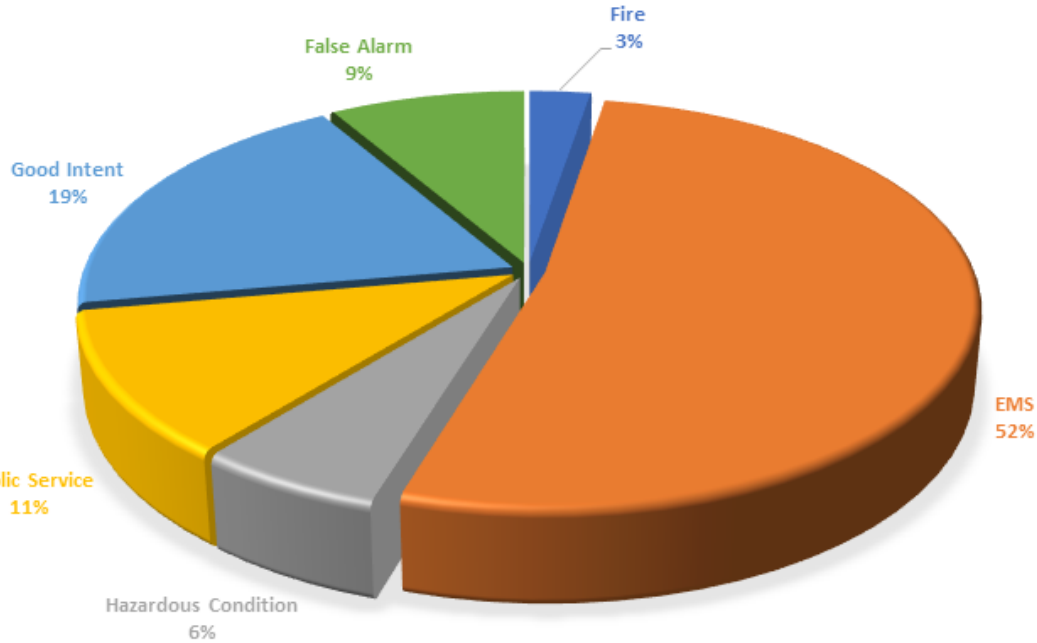

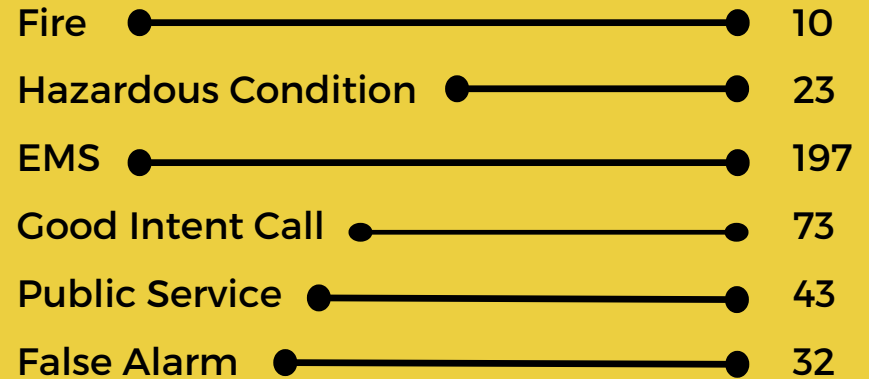

RESPONSES BY PERCENTAGE



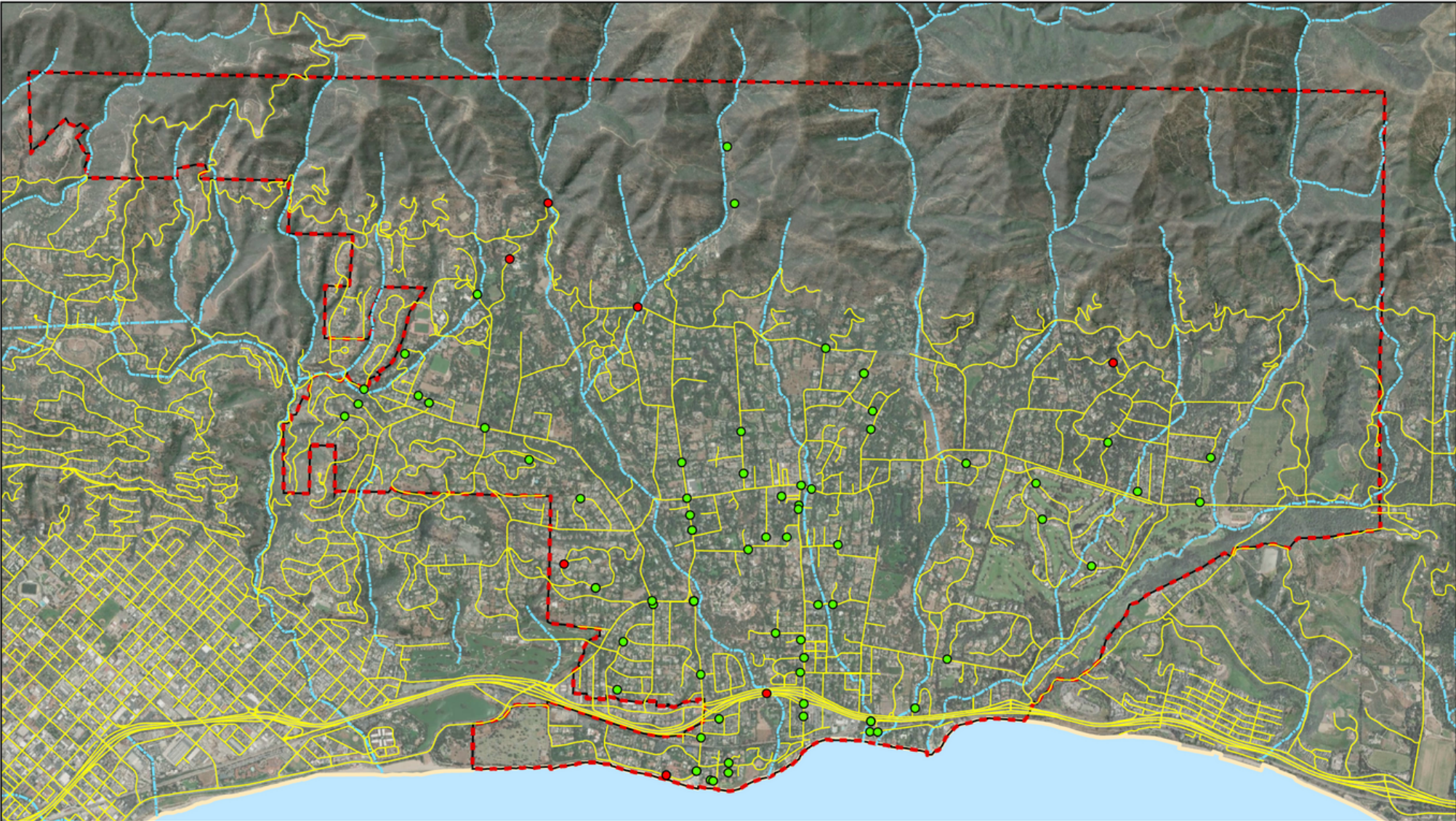
RESPONSES BY CATEGORY



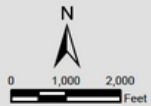

MUTUAL AID RESPONSES

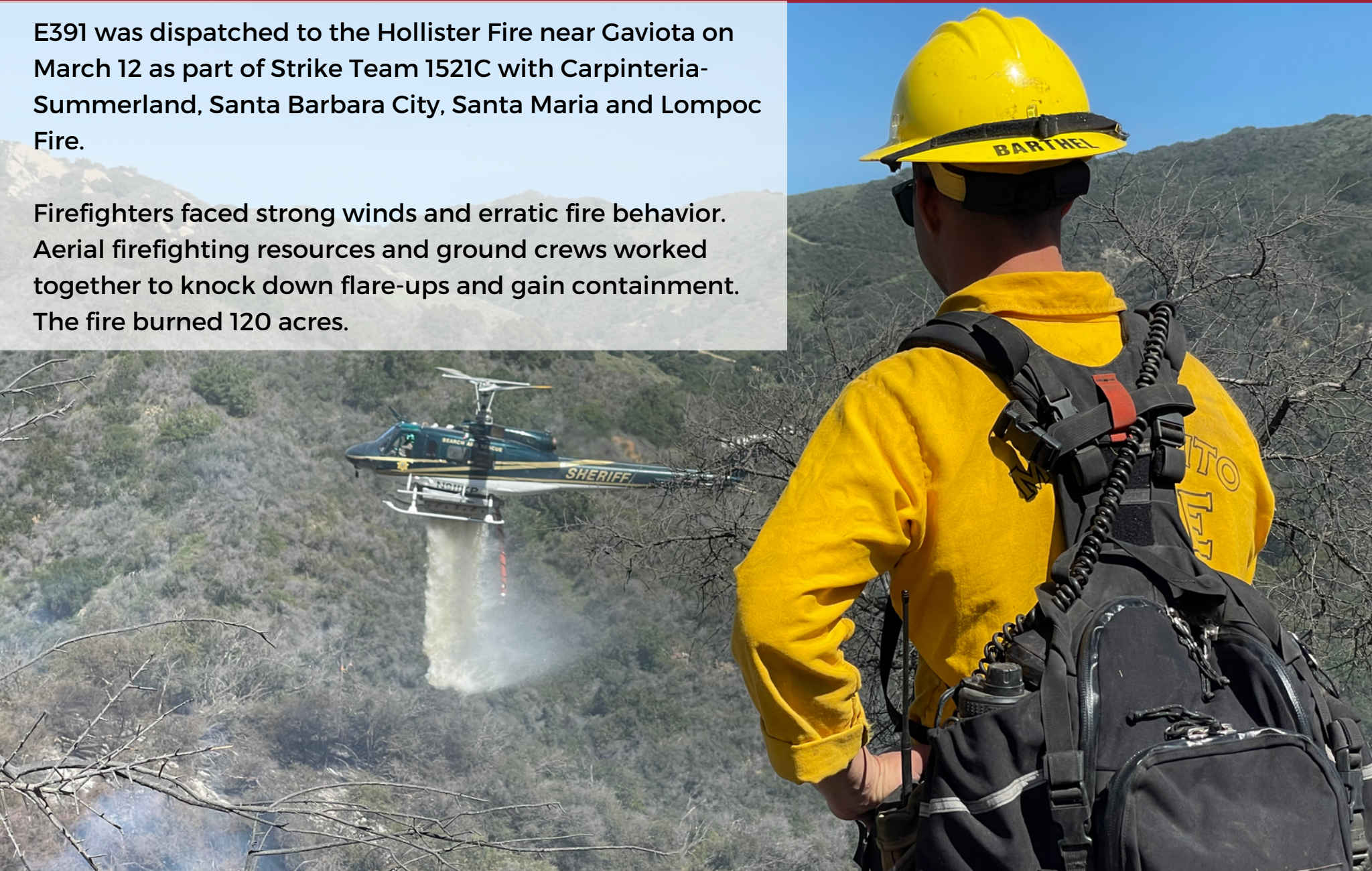
In late January, E391 responded to the Colorado Fire near Big Sur. We worked with a local strike team including Santa Maria, Lompoc, Santa Barbara City and Carpinteria-Summerland to put out hot spots and mop up around structures. This winter wildfire reminds us that fires can happen anytime in CA.



MUTUAL AID RESPONSES

E391 was dispatched to the Hollister Fire near Gaviota on March 12 as part of Strike Team 1521C with Carpinteria-Summerland, Santa Barbara City, Santa Maria and Lompoc Fire.

Firefighters faced strong winds and erratic fire behavior. Aerial firefighting resources and ground crews worked together to knock down flare-ups and gain containment. The fire burned 120 acres.



NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS



Carpinteria-Summerland firefighters were picking up dinner on Feb. 19 when they noticed smoke, called it into the South Coast Dispatch Center and responded to the scene. Firefighters found smoke and flames coming from two manhole covers and another opening under a bridge along Highway 101 between Bailard and Casitas Pass Rd, as well as along the 5700 block of Via Real. Montecito firefighters assisted along with Ventura County Fire and Santa Barbara City Fire.

The storm drain where the fire occurred was lined with a thick plastic material which caused the fire to continue burning intensely for hours. CSFPD requested Montecito Fire's engine that is specially equipped with a Compressed Air Foam System (CAFS). Firefighters sprayed the foam into the storm drain to eliminate the fire's oxygen source and successfully extinguish it.

Harry was taken to Dr. Wolff's ranch in Los Olivos until he could be admitted to the nearby Alamo Pintado Equine Medical Center. When they were able to admit Harry, Santa Barbara County firefighters from Station 31 helped load Harry back into the trailer.

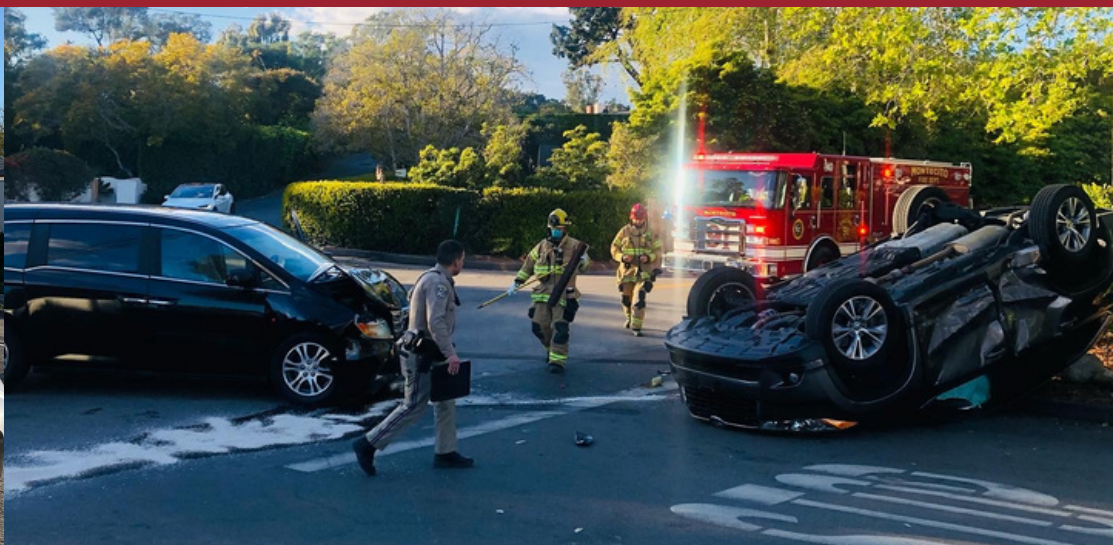
Harry showed signs of improvement for several days but sadly, suffered a series of seizures and the decision was made to humanely euthanize him on March 22.
